Course Approval

The syllabus was approved by the Faculty of Health, Science and Technology 2019-09-11, and is valid from the Spring semester 2020 at Karlstad University.

Prerequisites

At least 60 ECTS credits completed, plus upper secondary level Swedish 3 or Swedish as a second language 3 and English 6, or equivalent

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, students should be able to:

Knowledge and understanding

- identify and reflect upon different definitions of child maltreatment and different forms of violence against children,
- state early signs and symptoms of child maltreatment ,
- give an account of and problematise the occurrence of child maltreatment in historical and international perspectives, and

- describe short- and long-term effects of child maltreatment at the individual and societal levels.

Competence and skills

- identify protective and risk factors for child maltreatment at the individual, group, and society levels,
- demonstrate the ability to approach children and families in a professionally and respectful way, and
- reflect on the importance of professional cooperation and collaboration when working with child maltreatment.

Judgement and approach

- assess and address children's rights in terms of conventions and legislation,
- relate child maltreatment to public health policies and national public health goals.

Content

The course is offered as part-time distance education with mandatory campus meetings early and late in the course. Instruction at campus meetings is in the form of lectures, group exercises, and examination seminars. An internet-based virtual learning environment is used in the course. The course comprises the following components:

- definitions of child maltreatment and different forms of violence against children
- occurrence of child abuse
- consequences of child maltreatment
- signs and symptoms of child maltreatment
- the disclosure process
- protective and risk factors for child maltreatment
- professional conduct
- cooperation and collaboration when working with child maltreatment
- the rights of the child
- public health policy and national public health goals

Examination

Assessment is based on an individual written hand-in assignment and assignments presented and discussed in mandatory seminars.

If students have a decision from Karlstad University entitling them to special pedagogical support due to a documented disability, the examiner has the right to give such students an adapted examination or to examine them in a different manner.

Grades

One of the grades Distinction (VG), Pass (G), or Fail (U) is awarded in the examination of the course.

Quality Assurance

Follow-up relating to learning conditions and goal-fulfilment takes place both during and upon completion of the course in order to ensure continuous improvement. Course evaluation is partly based on student views and experiences obtained in accordance with current regulations and partly on other data and documentation. Students will be informed of the result of the evaluation and of any measures to be taken.

A course certificate will be provided upon request.

Additional information

The course is offered at master level to students on the VAMAS Master Programme in Health Science with a specialisation in Public Health Sciences. It is also open as a free-standing course to other students.
