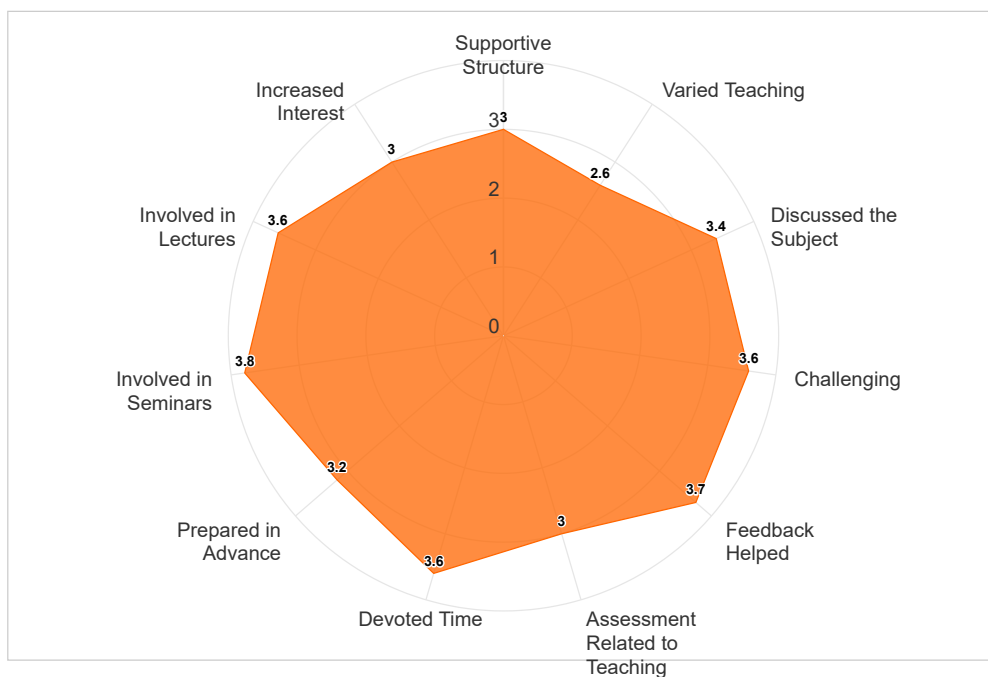

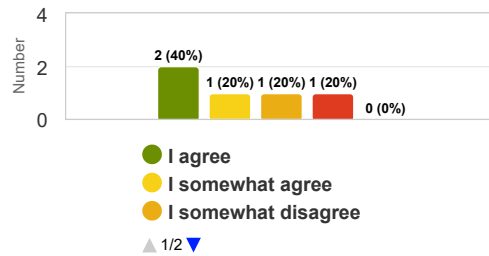

Results of learning

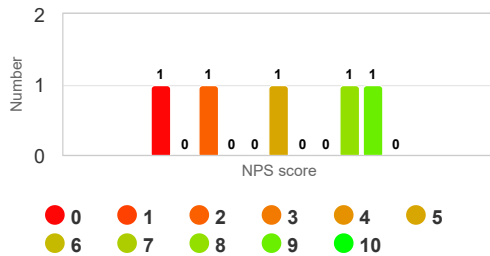
All in all, the course was valuable for me.

Net Promoter Score (NPS) = -40

The Net Promoter Score (NPS) is a metric that measures student experience and predicts the effectiveness of a course. It calculates an NPS score based on a key question using a 0-10 scale, asking how likely students would recommend the course to others. Respondents are grouped into Promoters, Passives, or Detractors based on their score, and the NPS is calculated by subtracting the percentage of Detractors from the percentage of Promoters. The NPS is a core metric for course evaluation programs and is trusted by educational institutions to engage their students and improve their learning experience performance.

Comments

Course supervisor's comments

With just five of 22 participants commenting, it is difficult to extract a generalizable conclusion from the feedback, particularly since negative aspects (in particular related to workload) seem to refer to the course DVAD29 which almost all students took in parallel and for which I am responsible, too. These aspects are addressed in my comments to the course evaluation there.

The remaining feedback is largely positive. For the next iteration, we plan for additional sessions to discuss the quizzes and/or lectures in flipped classroom style if provided resources allow.
