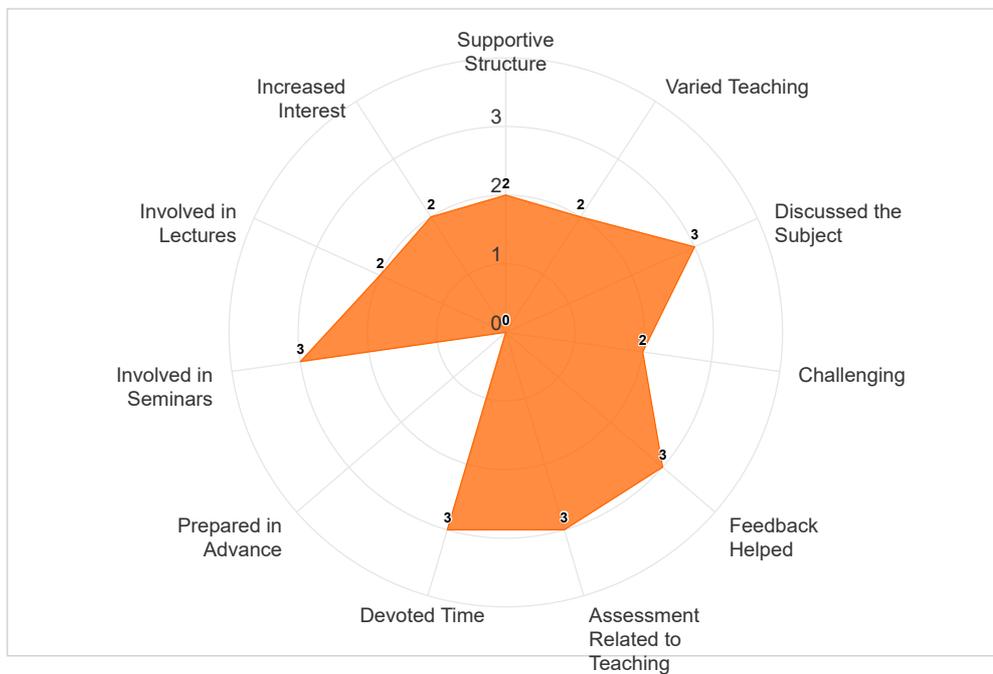

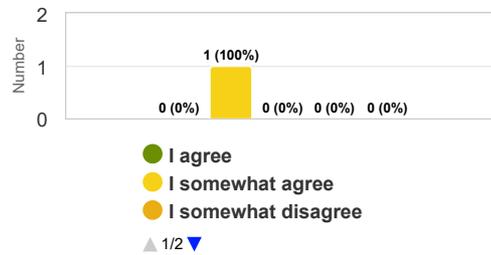

Results of learning

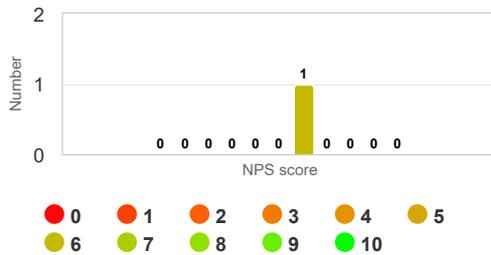
All in all, the course was valuable for me.

The Net Promoter Score (NPS) is a metric that measures student experience and predicts the effectiveness of a course. It calculates an NPS score based on a key question using a 0-10 scale, asking how likely students would recommend the course to others. Respondents are grouped into Promoters, Passives, or Detractors based on their score, and the NPS is calculated by subtracting the percentage of Detractors from the percentage of Promoters. The NPS is a core metric for course evaluation programs and is trusted by educational institutions to engage their students and improve their learning experience performance.

Course supervisor's comments

One exchange student participated. "The course could profit from improving the structure and coordination of the course, strengthening the communication between teachers.[...] I believe, the course could also profit from clearer guidelines on the assignments, requirements were not always clearly communicated, for example on the final assignment whether it should be an academic-style proposal or an internal planning document." Also, "The final assignment's template felt rushed."

"Overall, the course was interesting since it provided a deeper understanding of the research methodologies, like DSR, AR, CSR. [...] Organizing group work over the holidays where many people had limited availability was challenging and the applicability of this kind of planning felt limited."

For next year, the course coordinator and teachers should go through all assignments and templates before the course starts.
