One of two registered students filled in the evaluation. One of the students had already decided to re-register for the course next term and go on working on the thesis 50 %. Both of the students work full time as teachers, which means that it probably makes more sense to write a 30 hp thesis over two terms rather than one. Working full time is reflected in the number of hours the student who filled in the evaluation has been able to spend on the thesis during the term. The student is generally happy with the course and praises the feedback from the supervisor, but suggests that it would be helpful with more films explaining students' repeated mistakes as well as on strategies of defending the essay (in the final seminar, I presume).
