This course has had a specific form for several years, including the set of examination items and their credit points. This year the number of students was the highest ever, which had some consequences for the teaching. Several students decided early in the course to drop out from the lectures and also not take part in the non-compulsory seminars. As a result there has obviously been some misunderstandings, which could have been avoided if students have simply asked the teachers. Unfortunately the results on the written examinations were the lowest ever, and I attribute this to a combination of not enough active students and a course which is overviewing on a vast subject area with a course information, presented on Lecture 1 stating: "Teaching: The course will require a high degree of self studies."

Students who answered the evaluations were mainly content with the course with regards to knowledge development, examination focus, teacher professionality and report that they have spent a fair amount of time studying this course. Student comments, however, were more negative. Some consider the course too simple, while other point to course information problems regarding main objectives to be examined etc. The main book including the end-of-chapter problems did not match the lectures fully, or vice versa. One student suggested to make at least one of the seminars compulsory, in order to force everyone to present orally at least once before the project presentation.

Suggestions for changes to the next course date.

No major changes are considered necessary. Improved information about the learning outcomes and the forms of examination will be given. Making one of the seminars compulsory will be considered with its pro's and con's. Improved information about the form of the project report, including how to use sources and add references will be given, although this is on the first page of the Library web, https://www.kau.se/en/library/writing-referencing/and-citing/writing-references/writing-references (also in Swedish).
