

## Changes suggested in the course analysis of the previous course date:


The previous course ran in 2014, and had positive evaluations - but it was considered a bit lecture-heavy, so this time, group work and discussion time was added for each seminar.





The evaluations are positive, and the students seem to have appreciated the group work on data analysis included in most sessions. A few considered the readings heavy, and that can be taken into account for next time, perhaps by using pre-recorded short lectures on particular readings so that class time can be spent on discussions. some wished for more time for the exam, as the last session was just a few days before the final submission date. This is true, and will be amended for next time through several shorter assignments instead of a final paper only.

The course has run in Zoom, which has worked well, and students have contributed actively to each session.

## Suggestions for changes to the next course date.

The evaluations are very positive, but the current syllabus for the course is up for revision soon, so some changes will be implemented. The examination assignments will change to shorter empirical and theoretical pieces instead of a final paper, as it allows for a more even spread of the workload. The previous textbook (Harrington et al, on methods) will probably be brought back as mandatory reading, as the new textbook does not go into detail about methodological perspectives. The course will probably also go up to 7-8 seminars instead of six within the 10-week period. It will be co-taught by two teachers next time. These changes had been planned, but the course evaluations (readings, more seminars, shorter assignments) support the implementation of such changes.
