Suggestions for changes to the next course date.

- Zoom was introduced as a parallel/shadow option to Skype in the final third of this course and turned out a highly reliable, hassle-free and convenient choice for students and instructors alike. From 2019 onwards, Zoom will be the natural first choice for all audio-video communication on this course.

- Instead of being allocated a preliminary group with the option to change, students were asked to sign up for a study group based on their expected availability plus their general approach to group work and time management respectively (including self-confessed procrastinators). So most of them did and, while the apparent impact on team morale and group dynamics wasn?t quite as noticeable as intended and hoped for, it seems the better option so far.
