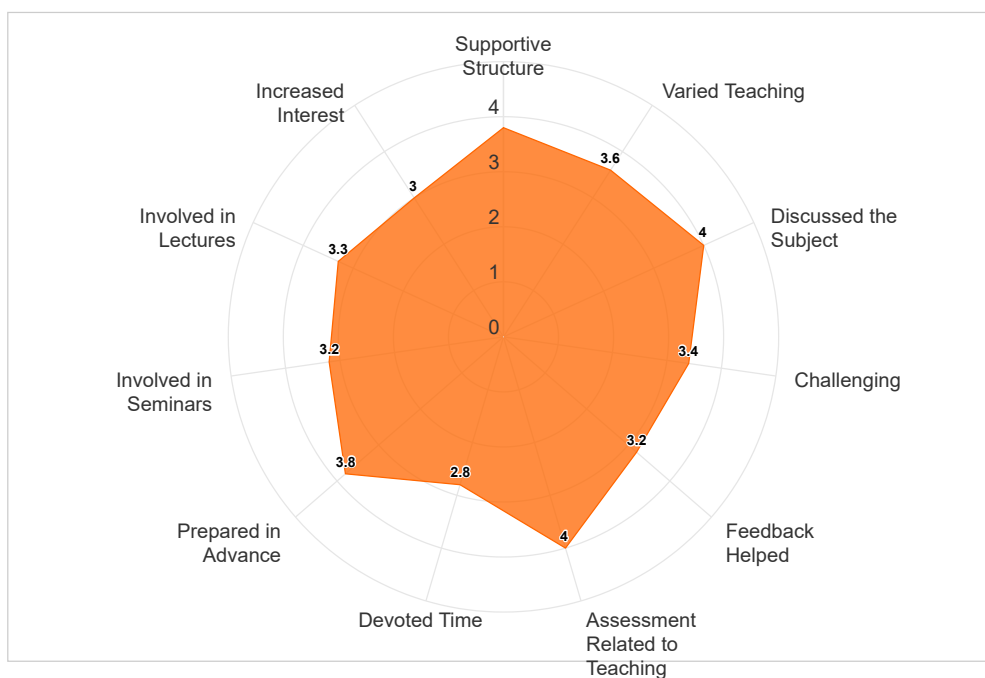

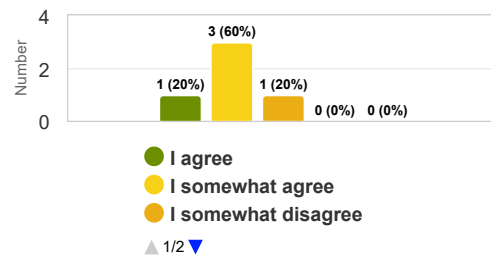

## Results of learning

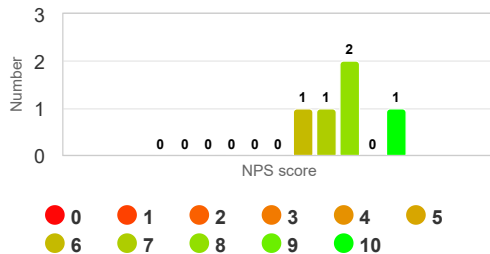
**All in all, the course was valuable for me.**

The Net Promoter Score (NPS) is a metric that measures student experience and predicts the effectiveness of a course. It calculates an NPS score based on a key question using a 0-10 scale, asking how likely students would recommend the course to others. Respondents are grouped into Promoters, Passives, or Detractors based on their score, and the NPS is calculated by subtracting the percentage of Detractors from the percentage of Promoters. The NPS is a core metric for course evaluation programs and is trusted by educational institutions to engage their students and improve their learning experience performance.

## **Kommentarer**

### **Course supervisor's comments**

First, thank you for your feedback on and participation in the course Men & masculinities (7,5 hp)! I am happy that so many seem to have enjoyed the course, its structure, the discussions and the final assignment. One student remarks that the regular writing tasks were helpful and another that the structure was transparent and easy to understand. Thank you for these comments; they indicate that the work that has been done to structure the course is now "paying off". It is indicated that the workload did not match the number of ECTS credits, but these numbers are difficult to evaluate, as it is not indicated in which direction. One student requests a blend between lectures and seminars and not just seminars. For this year, mini-lectures have been added to each seminar to introduce the topic and contextualise the course texts. One student requests more non-European writers. The literature includes authors from almost all continents already but more texts from the global south would be possible; I will look into this for the next iteration of the course. Thank you all for a good course, a lovely group dynamic, interesting discussions and good feedback, and best of luck with your future academic and non-academic endeavours! Best regards // Klara
